YOUTH GROUP

St Michael's Youth Group was recently re-established during the trying period of COVID-19, in July 2020. Our mission is to encourage the young to learn more about their faith and beliefs, by instilling in their hearts the love and peace of the Lord. Monthly meetings and Youth events have been organised with the aim of creating a social environment that makes them feel comfortable to communicate with one another, thus building our church community. Moreover, interactions with other sister church youth groups have been arranged with the purpose of engaging the youth and strengthening relationships and social groups.

Topics for the monthly meetings have been chosen by our youth themselves and are discussed amongst themselves as a focus group through lively questions and activities. This creates a platform for communication and support as well as for educating and guiding the youth and others. With such discussions, we hope to enlighten our youth spiritually, guide them to our Lord, and help strengthen their faith.

Rymonda, Mary, Etienne and Joe are the founders and coordinators of the St Michael's Youth Group. They all share a strong commitment and vision for our youth and are driven by their deep love for their church.

Having grown up ourselves in St Michael's church and being the descendants of families who were closely involved in the establishment of our church and eparchy, it is our goal to see our church fill up, as it was with many previous generations.

Our aim is to revive our church, draw back parishioners, create Sunday schools, encourage more church gatherings, welcoming people of all ages and our youth so that all together may be fulfilled with the blessings of our Lord.

A COIN HAS TWO FACES



On one side of a coin is the image of a prominent person; often symbolic of power, privilege and status. On the other side is the coin's monetary value. As a young person, you're likely to be a part of Generation Z, being born between 1997 and 2015. As a member of this generation, you are constantly faced with attempts to navigate power, privilege, status, and value. Perhaps as a digital native your world is dominated by your social media presence. Your feeds tell you what to look like, what to wear, how to behave. If a coin were minted in your honour, the front of your coin would contain the image of how you would like the world to see you, whether this image is real or not; the back of the coin, your value reflected in the number of likes you receive.

Maybe as a member of this generation,

you see the world as being in constant crisis — economic, political, climate, environmental, social crises? The nightly, daily, hourly news feeds constantly remind you of the problems in the world: murder, violence, theft, drug trafficking. Perhaps the front of your coin is an image of despair, the back of the coin having no value.

I would suggest that whilst these two coins are to a degree valid, there is another coin to consider. The image on the front is you, created by God, being perfectly and wonderfully made (Psalm 139). An image in which God has blessed you with gifts of the Spirit (1 Corinthians 12). You may recognize these gifts in an image of yourself or they may at this time still be hidden, revealing themselves in the course of your life.

The back of the coin is the plan of God's life for you. Your value is measured by the things you will do. Each of you will do things in your life for others. Ideally you will 'do things for people, not because of who they are or what they do in return, but because of who you are.' (Mother Teresa).

As a teacher, I would often challenge my students to think about the obituary which would be read out at their funeral. I know this may sound like quite a morose task and in some sense maybe it is, but I ask this with a purpose.

I ask the students the following questions, which I now ask you to also consider for yourself: What would you like people to say about you? How would you want to be remembered after you are gone? Interestingly, but not surprisingly, many use the following adjectives: kind, supportive, passionate, caring, understanding, creative, funny, a good person. Perhaps you also would like these words to be used to describe vourself. I remind the students that God does indeed have a plan for their life, that He has blessed each of them with specific aifts and talents to be used to live a life that honours and values who they are and who they were created to be.

Your hope is in knowing that you have been perfectly and wonderfully made and God has a plan for your life.

Melkite Heritage Display: archiving our Church's past for our future

I have a meaningful connection to our wonderful Melkite rite coupled with the fact that my family has a very long and important commitment to the church.

Since the days, when my family arrived in 1934, my late ancestor, Monsignor Malatios Chahoud, served as Parish Priest of St. Michael's at Waterloo. During his tenure, he sponsored his nieces and nephews (my grandparents' generation) to come to Australia. They all resided in the presbytery until they could afford homes of

their own. This association has meant that, for as long as I can remember, St. Michael's has always had a special place in my families' hearts and I am often told stories by my grandparents and their siblings about the time they spent there and, the parishioners and local residents they met who would later become close friends.

With all this in mind, the seeds of an idea were forming as early as March 2018 as to how I might adequately commemorate the very significant milestone of our church's 130-year presence in Australia (1891-2021). At

that time, I began detailed research involving sourcing photographs, text excerpts and other primary historical data. To my great surprise and delight, there was a wealth of archival material for me to work with that I sourced from storage in the Cathedral, the Eparchy Centre at Greenacre, Sydney City Council, the National Library of Australia and from the generous material donated by families.

My almost two years of work is now reaching fruition and I have been extremely fortunate that the Dean of St. Michael's, Fr. Gerges Albutros, has been supportive and encouraging of my project. I first approached him to discuss the prospect of presenting a Melkite Heritage Display at our Cathedral as it is the namesake of the original church and many of the sacred vessels and fitments from Waterloo remain (e.g., baptismal font, iconostasis, marble plaque, pews etc.). Having this important initiative displayed in Darlington means that people can view these pieces in the context of the church they are part of. As I progressed with my project, Fr.

Gerges worked hand-in-hand with me

GETTING TO KNOW ONE ANOTHER

Young parishioners, Daniel and Natalie Istanbouli.

 Daniel, you have been involved with St Michael's Cathedral for a long time. What does this church mean to you?

St Michael's Cathedral is home for me. It is where I find myself spiritually, centre myself and can distinguish between earthly cares and spirituality. Since my birth I was connected with St Michael's Cathedral, which is of great significance to me. My parents as well as members of my extended family were either married or baptized in this church, paving the path for my beautiful wife Natalie and myself to get married at St Michael's. During my long association with St Michael's, I have witnessed the church at its peak but sadly have also seen a dramatic decline in the number of parishioners attending the church, especially the youth. However, this has only inspired me to remain determined and hopeful that through the Holy Spirit our youth will find the light and path back to their home at St Michael's Cathedral.

 What are your aspirations for our church and what directions do you suggest we should take, particularly concerning the youth involvement?

I believe the church needs transparency from the top. Churches have a hierarchy model, with information passing from the top down. The lack of transparency can lead to misunderstanding or misinterpretation, creating an unsettling atmosphere. With uncertainty among the community, people tend to discuss certain issues and become increasingly frustrated over matters that could have easily been clarified. Sadly, the youth of the church suffer; they hear how sad and frustrated their parents are about church related matters. In addition to this discouraging fact, the current social problems the world faces, only results in the youth feeling disengaged. We need to hear the voice of the youth rather than to suppress them, they may have the answers.

 As a young couple with a baby tell us about your experience in meeting each other and your decision to tie the knot in the Melkite rite.

I met Natalie 11 years ago, when she was 16 and I was 17. I instantly fell in love with her and knew she was going to be my wife and we would start a family together. Very early in our relationship, I introduced Natalie to St Michael's church. Even though she belongs to the Roman Catholic Church, she admired my commitment and dedication in serving my church and the Melkite traditions. She embraced this wholeheartedly and joined me in attending Sunday masses, becoming a regular parishioner and now a member of the Parish Council. Natalie has told me that the love she has for me has drawn her closer to the church. On my part, the love and commitment I have for my wife draws me closer to God. What better connection can you have with your wife than receiving Christ together each Sunday! What better celebration is there than to pray together in God's house! Now with our son Noah joining us as a family, we will continue to serve our church and grow

 How does your faith influence your marriage and the way you bring up your child?

It is a simple equation: God, my wife Natalie and myself. Without this equation, there is no love. Our religion continuously describes God as Love. Therefore, I cannot experience nor know true love without this equation. Furthermore, my calling in life, well my first calling, is to be a good husband to Natalie. This means to follow in the footsteps of Saint Joseph, to be obedient and to understand marriage and fatherhood. God has blessed me with a family, a beautiful child has come into our lives who has taught me unconditional love, the love of a father and that of a husband. To fully understand the equation, does take time and commitment. Attending mass, listening to the word of God and praying, as a family is so important

because a family without God is not complete. Too often in my profession I see people, who sadly distance themselves from their families and only focus on their earthly needs without considering God in the equation. Time and time again, I see the adverse outcomes, the sadness and loneliness this brings to them.

 Finally what advice would you give young married couples contemplating parenting?

We should thank our parents for opening the door to our faith, showing us the right path, and loving us unconditionally. This is the first experience we all have of love. Never hide your faith or be ashamed of it. Remember Jesus was mocked for speaking the truth. He is always with you. Love your wife or husband unconditionally, be attentive and listen to them because God speaks through them and you do not want to miss the opportunity. Love cannot be found in materialistic things but is found in the church. When you look at your partner praying and receiving Christ you will see a glow that you have never seen before. Pray for one another and be patient in your prayers for they will be answered. Ask God for support in your relationship and remember to always add God to your equation, making Him the centre, the beginning, and the end of everything, and then you will certainly experience real happiness and contentment.

YOUTH AND HOPE IN A CHANGING WORLD

The "World Youth Report" concluded that "if we want a better future, we have to urgently invest in those who will create it". The youth of today face many challenges and have a huge burden laid on their shoulders: rising unemployment, lower wages, extreme poverty, homelessness, spread of drugs, climate change, the threat of wars, increase in violence and extremism, and now the pandemic. A pessimist may lose faith in the future of our world. But a recent study conducted in 15 countries found that young people are more optimistic about the future than older generations. The youth are confident that they can build a better future for themselves and for those who follow. The United Nations "World Youth Report" is clear: "Young people have the potential to save the world. All we have to do is let them do just that".

But where is our responsibility? It lies in preparing them for the task ahead.

This includes giving them quality education, as this increases their chances of finding suitable work. Young people should be given the opportunity, or indeed be encouraged to go as far as they can, not only at school, but also in technical or tertiary education. The world has changed from what it used to be ten or twenty years ago and is rapidly changing. The future generations need to acquire a mixture of skills. Communication skills, teamwork and critical thinking are now much more needed than memorising facts as we used to study at school in the past. Technology develops very fast today, transforming the work methods and environment, and young people need to be abreast of such changes. But the world is also more connected than before, and the future generation will not be isolated from the world problems.

Amid this, we should not forget the spiritual side of life. While the dictionaries

define religion as a system of beliefs and rituals, the word religion comes from a Latin word that means "to bind together", and indeed to belong to a religion includes in addition to sharing its beliefs being part of a community and, sometimes, a culture. Religion teaches us how we should act towards one another, a most essential skill for succeeding in life. One of the saddest things is seeing the disproportionate attendance at a church between the older and younger generations. Some of the young think that rejecting religion is a kind of freedom, yet others see religion as a guide on how to live, it is something that one chooses to do. We should also remember that often our practice of religion changes over the course of our lives. Thus, it is frequent that youth rebel and reject religion and traditions, but we should not give up, they usually come back, particularly if the foundation was strong.

"IT IS IN GIVING THAT WE RECEIVE"

Attending St. Michael's Meals this evening for the first time was a truly humbling and uplifting experience. On my visits to the church, I would see dedicated volunteers bringing in delicious homecooked meals and sorting them into individual food packs. These visits left an imprint on me as I was inspired by their commitment to such a worthwhile social outreach program.

The geographical position of St. Michael's Melkite Cathedral is advantageous in that it allows parishioners to apply the Christian teachings of charity by helping others (especially the disadvantaged) in our local community with social issues that exist in Darlington and the neighbouring suburbs.

After contacting the St. Michael's Meals organisers, I was rostered to attend the Wednesday evening 'Christmas Party'. I was a little apprehensive as it would be my first encounter with some of the people who might be suffering from homelessness, mental health issues or drug addiction. However, the prospect of singing carols, providing a hot meal, sharing a conversation and the encouraging nature of my fellow volunteers put me at ease.

At the Cathedral, boxes containing hot and cold meals, fresh fruit and produce were organised, individually packed and loaded into the two vans, marked

with the charity's logo. With close to 40 devoted volunteers, we handed out hampers and sang Christmas carols in both English and Arabic at Martin Place and Central Station. On first approach, I saw dozens of people who are facing food insecurity waiting for our arrival, some chanting "St. Michael's" as the bus came. Many of the homeless await this visit each week and are familiar with the volunteers, some telling their friends about our initiative.

After setting up the tables and handing out my designated fruit box, it was immediately obvious that many of these people wanted to share a conversation more than to simply take a hamper or meal.

For regular members, there seemed to be many memorable faces who welcomed our presence and joined in the carolling! The reality of homelessness and food insecurity in Sydney was most evident for me when an older lady stopped and said "It is so heartwarming for me to see someone so young coming along. You made me feel like a human!" It struck me that too often, thousands of Australians will dismiss or walk past the homeless without even making eye contact. Another lady said: "Oh my! I haven't had cherries in years." as we handed her some of the fruit. The smiles on

their faces and the joy they felt was infectious! Each one of them wished us a "Merry Christmas" and said, "God Bless You!" and we echoed their sentiments!

These experiences have been etched into my memory and I hope that in subsequent weeks, I will have more unforgettable moments that will alter and shape my understanding of social problems that exist in the city that we call fortunate and flourishing.

The group splits on Wednesday nights at 7.00 pm to feed the homeless at Central Station and Martin Place. Our aim is to build a trusting relationship with our friends, the needy, so that we not only feed their bodies, but also their souls. The relief, gratitude and friendship of the people we reach is our reward. No-one chooses to be on the street, we look into their eyes and see the person inside. Each has a story, we know the regulars by name and even know their likes and dislikes. So many have an intellectual disability, who are we to judge the circumstances that pushed them onto the street? The church asks us to imitate the life of the

saints: so let's listen to their words: St Mother Teresa cautions us "If you judge people, you have no time to love them." Our own Australian St Mary Mackillop encourages us to "Never see a need without doing something about it". It is so true that when we give, we receive so much more. Not only do we feel that we have made a difference to the lives of the people we feed, but it has also created a real affection and camaraderie between the people, who show up every week to serve, and the regular disadvantaged on the streets of Sydney.

The disadvantaged are not only our brothers and sisters who live on the street but also many of the elderly, who suffer from loneliness, isolation and frequently experience difficulties in communication. Our aim is to establish

regular contact with these senior individuals and lend them a hand whenever needed.

With the youth being the future of our society, their involvement in our activities is essential in preparing them to carry the flag and build a better, happier world for everyone.

Our motivation is simple and can be found in the Gospel: Matthew 25: 35-40 "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink. The righteous will ask: Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink?... The King will reply: Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

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
